



**Ravenna City Council  
Regular Meeting Minutes  
Monday, November 3, 2025, at 6:00 pm**

**The Regular Council Meeting was held in person in Council Chambers.**

**The Regular Council Meeting was called to order at 6:00 P.M. November 3, 2025, by Council President, Rob Kairis**

**Moment of Meditation & Silence**

President Kairis called a moment of meditation and silence.

**Pledge to Flag**

President Kairis then led those in attendance in the Pledge of Allegiance.

**Delegations from the Public:** Cliff Soudil addressed Council by wishing them a Happy Thanksgiving and reminded everyone to exercise their right to vote in the upcoming election, emphasizing the importance of civic participation and the sacrifices made by those who secured that right. He then raised a concern regarding short-term rental properties within the city, citing a recent issue in Bath Township involving an Airbnb that had been operating despite local restrictions. Mr. Soudil explained that when he had asked about Ravenna's stance on the matter, he had received mixed answers, with some saying it was under the Planning Commission's purview and others pointing to Council. He asked for clarification on where the City currently stood on regulating such rentals and what direction Council planned to take.

Ms. West responded that she had discussed the topic earlier in the day with Ms. Lorence, who had compiled a list of all short-term rentals within the city. Ms. West said that she intended to place the issue on the November Planning Committee agenda for further discussion and review, assuring Soudil that the matter would be addressed.

Mr. Soudil thanked Council for their attention, expressing his hope that Ravenna could avoid similar problems seen elsewhere.

Christine Untrauer introduced herself to City Council as a representative of the Veterans Grave Marker Project. She explained that the organization identifies unmarked veteran graves in local cemeteries, completes the necessary paperwork to obtain VA headstones, and funds the installation of those markers. Ms. Untrauer shared that she had been working closely with Mark Gabriel and Ravenna Township, noting that the program had been well received by the community. She reported that just the previous week, 17 veterans' markers were installed in Maple Grove Cemetery—five of which had been entirely unmarked. These included graves dating as far back as the Civil War. Ms. Untrauer described the deep sense of purpose that drives the project, explaining that many veterans' graves had gone unrecognized for decades and that giving them proper markers restores honor and dignity to their memory. She further explained a legislative issue affecting their work and explained that veterans who died before November 30, 1990, and were buried in private cemeteries, are currently ineligible for government-issued military markers if they already have a private headstone. Ms. Untrauer noted that she was working with state officials, including Heidi Workman, to advance legislation to change this rule, allowing these veterans to receive the recognition they deserve. In response to questions from Mr. Calfee, Ms. Untrauer described how her team identifies unmarked graves. In areas like the cemetery's potter's field—where 136 people are buried—many graves were never formally recorded, and some individuals were interred without caskets or headstones. Her group uses cemetery records, historical data, and mapping tools such as *Find a Grave* to match existing records with physical markers, revealing which veterans remain unmarked. Ms. Untrauer shared specific examples, including a Civil War veteran named

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McGlynn, whose grave was finally marked after months of effort, and a Vietnam veteran, Willie Dennis, whose grave inspired the start of the entire project. She said the work relies entirely on donations, with no federal or state funding. To raise funds, the group repurposes retired cemetery flags that once flew over veterans' graves. Volunteers wash, iron, and sew brass rings onto the flags, transforming them into ornaments accompanied by a small card explaining their origin. Each ornament is available for a \$5 donation, with proceeds used to fund marker installations.

Ms. Michael commended Ms. Untrauer for her dedication, remarking on how meaningful it was to ensure that veterans receive lasting recognition. Ms. Michael encouraged fellow Council members and residents to remember local individuals and organizations, like Ms. Untrauer's, when submitting nominations for community awards through groups such as the Chamber of Commerce and Celebrate Portage.

Ms. Untrauer thanked Council for allowing her to speak and for their support of the project. She expressed her hope that with greater community involvement—particularly from student volunteers skilled in technology—the effort could expand more quickly. Ms. Untrauer concluded by reaffirming the project's mission: to ensure that no veteran in Ravenna County lies in an unmarked grave.

Mr. Kairis proposed removing Ordinance 2025-111 from the consent agenda and placing it under first readings, asking if anyone else had changes.

Mr. Moskun commented on Ordinance 2025-109, explaining that it involved a new water line replacement from Lake Avenue to the railroad tracks due to the poor condition of the existing line. He clarified that the ordinance was reallocating funds, originally from the water tank fund, to cover the project. After brief discussion, the council agreed to keep Ordinance 2025-109 in the consent agenda.

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**Invited City Officials:** Parks and Recreation Director, Chris Bundy, addressed Council to present his departmental report. Mr. Bundy began by expressing gratitude for the warm welcome and shared a brief background, noting that he previously worked for the City of Canal Fulton and was excited to join the City of Ravenna. He stated that he has been married for 16 years with four children, and emphasized his family's enthusiasm about becoming involved in the city's programs and events. Mr. Bundy provided several department updates, beginning with West Main School's Arbor Day tree planting, where students planted a red maple and a flowering poplar with help from city staff. He noted that restrooms at City Park and Chestnut Park had been winterized and that the Parks Board recently toured Sunbeau Valley Farm to discuss future plans. Security camera installation at SunbeauValley Farm was being explored, and the property was being prepared for winter before new programming begins in the spring. Looking ahead to 2026, Mr. Bundy shared plans to host the annual Easter Egg Hunt and Halloween events at Sunbeau Valley Farm, introduce hayrides and other seasonal activities, and permanently move successful archery programs there. He also highlighted the growing popularity of pickleball, with two recent clinics and plans for future leagues and additional classes. Mr. Bundy reported that the department's Halloween drive-through event attracted about 400 participants and that current offerings such as youth basketball, gymnastics, and bus trips were running successfully. He mentioned ongoing departmental planning for 2026 to expand programs, fill scheduling gaps, and better reach residents. Regarding funding, Mr. Bundy discussed the Emerald Lake project and the city's recent grant presentation to the Ohio Public Works Commission. Although the process was highly competitive, he was optimistic about potential funding and shared that the city would pursue additional opportunities through the Land and Water Conservation Fund if needed. Mr. Bundy outlined his goals, including expanding program offerings and participation, improving outreach to families, and exploring new ideas such as a disc golf course at Chestnut Hill to attract visitors and support local businesses. Other potential initiatives included a youth drama club and a senior games event. To improve communication, he suggested distributing flyers directly to students, collaborating with Raven Packs, and creating a printed yearly program guide for residents. He concluded by noting that staff had recently conducted a survey of 500 past participants to identify interests and improve community engagement.

Mr. Kairis thanked Mr. Bundy for his presentation and welcomed him to Ravenna, encouraging him to pursue the disc golf course idea and to reach out to Council whenever support was needed. He also inquired about youth basketball participation, to which Mr. Bundy explained that local teams were still competing in external leagues but that the department hoped to reestablish in-town play in the future.

Ms. Michael voiced enthusiasm for the proposed senior challenge event and suggested reviving the former "Community Cup Challenge," a popular inter-business competition that once fostered citywide camaraderie.

Mr. Bundy responded that he and the Chamber of Commerce had already discussed the idea of bringing that event back next year.

Council thanked Mr. Bundy for his detailed report and expressed excitement for the direction of the Parks and Recreation Department.

**Cemetery:** Ms. West provided an update on cemetery matters and reported that the longtime tree service provider, Andy “the Lumberjack,” has retired, and alternative tree service options are being explored. She explained that health insurance renewal for cemetery staff is expected to be finalized soon and the bridge railing project is still under review, with costs and design details being determined. Ms. West also shared a lighter update about a goose with angel wings that was rescued, leaving its mate at the pond. Efforts are underway to safely reunite the pair. She noted that pond maintenance has been renewed and expanded, now covering all four ponds instead of just two, with additional treatments and plans to explore installing fountains in at least one pond. Regarding cemetery roads, discussions continue on paving versus chip-and-seal options, with the Cemetery Sexton coordinating with city staff to assess road conditions.

Mr. Cimino added that a contract between the cemetery and the Maple Grove Historical Society has been executed, and donations have already begun for the chapel renovation.

**Parks & Recreation:** Mr. Marovich stated that Mr. Bundy had already provided all the updates.

**First Reading of Ordinances:**

**ORDINANCE NO. 2025-111** AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING THE MAYOR TO NEGOTIATE THE PURCHASE OF PROPERTY FOR OSBORN PARK WITH NS RAILROAD, AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

Mr. Kairis introduced the first reading of an ordinance authorizing the Mayor to negotiate the purchase of property for Osborne Park with NS Railroad. He suggested entering executive session to discuss the property purchase, citing the need for special wording to avoid giving a competitive or bargaining advantage due to premature disclosure.

A motion to enter executive session was made and seconded, but Mr. Calfee raised concerns about splitting executive sessions on multiple topics and the timing of discussions. After debate, a roll call vote was taken and failed.

Council then moved to reschedule the ordinance discussion to follow the Mayor’s Remarks on the agenda and aligning it with a planned executive session later in the agenda.

Mr. Kairis noted that the ordinance would be addressed in the meeting after the executive session.

**RESOLUTION NO. 2025-112** A RESOLUTION DECLARING THE NECESSITY FOR AN ADDITIONAL TWENTY-FIVE HUNDREDTHS OF ONE PERCENT INCOME TAX TO PROVIDE FUNDS FOR THE PURPOSE OF PLANNING AND BUILDING A NEW FIRE STATION, POLICE STATION AND CITY HALL IN THE CITY OF RAVENNA, OHIO , AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

Mr. Kairis introduced the resolution proposing an additional 0.25% income tax to fund the planning and construction of a new fire station, police station, and city hall.

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Ms. West recommended moving the resolution onto second reading.

**Second Reading of Ordinances:**

**ORDINANCE NO. 2025-094** AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING THE MAYOR TO ENTER INTO AN AGREEMENT WITH ARCHER ENERGY, LLC FOR THE CITY OF RAVENNA NATURAL GAS AGGREGATION PROGRAM FOR THE PERIOD OF JUNE 2025 THROUGH MARCH 2027, AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

Mr. Moskun noted that recent Energy Choice Ohio rates had not changed much and encouraged anyone interested to review them independently.

Mr. Kairis reported that the city had received a new fixed-rate offer of \$5.159 per MCF, locked in through March 2027. He compared this with current projections that November's bill would total around \$3.826 per MCF, emphasizing the uncertainty of future rates.

Council members discussed the pros and cons of locking in a long-term fixed rate versus remaining on the current variable rate. Concerns included seasonal rate changes, the impact on residents—especially seniors—and the difficulty in predicting market trends. Some members noted that current variable rates were significantly lower than the proposed fixed rate.

Cliff Soudil questioned how individuals could obtain much lower rates on their own while the city was being offered rates over \$5. He urged Council to stay vigilant, consider future negotiation alternatives, and educate residents on how to seek their own rates if desired.

Larry Silenius asked whether the city was obligated to continue working with the current broker and suggested exploring other options once the contract ends in 2027.

Mr. Marovich argued that gas companies hedge fixed-rate offers to protect themselves from market uncertainty, which results in higher fixed rates. He supported remaining on the variable rate while informing residents that they could opt out and choose their own supplier if conditions changed.

The discussion concluded with the reminder that the ordinance was on its second reading and it was moved on to a third reading.

There being no further comments or questions.

Ordinance 2025-094 was left on for third reading.

**Third Reading of Ordinances: None**

**Old Business- None**

**New Business-** Ms. Michael shared that she had received a letter from Ms. Kathy Roofner regarding volunteer opportunities with the Loaves and Fishes program at the First United Methodist Church. She explained that in the past, several Council members, including the Council Clerk, had participated in the effort, which provides takeout lunches every Saturday—the only hot meal service available that day since Center of Hope is closed. Ms. Michael noted that the church typically prepares about 150 meals each week and welcomes volunteers to help cook and serve or to donate gift cards, such as \$10 vouchers to local restaurants like Taco Bell. She emphasized how rewarding the experience had been, particularly in serving senior citizens and local residents, and encouraged Council members to consider volunteering for upcoming 2026 dates, which Mrs. Roofner left with the Council Clerk. She added that the Clerk could later email the available dates for anyone interested or for those who might connect other groups to assist.

**President of Council Remarks-** Mr. Kairis congratulated the Clerk of Council on being elected to the Ohio Municipal Clerks Association board. He commended her achievement among clerks from across the state and expressed pride in her accomplishment. Mr. Kairis noted that her involvement provides valuable perspective, helping Ravenna stay connected with other communities that face similar challenges and often find creative solutions. He thanked her for her continued service to both the city and the community.

**Council Member Remarks**

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**Ms. West-** Ms. West thanked everyone for contributing to a successful Halloween in Ravenna. She noted that the city's festivities included Trunk-or-Treat, downtown events with vendors, and neighborhood trick-or-treating throughout the day. Ms. West said the activities went smoothly and created a fun, positive atmosphere. She shared that she enjoyed assisting and spending time with the police department as they interacted with children, adding that it was wonderful to see so many families out enjoying the community.

**Mr. Calfee-** No Comment

**Mr. Moskun-** Mr. Moskun congratulated Mr. Bundy on settling into his new position, expressing confidence in his fresh ideas and open-minded approach. He said he believes Mr. Bundy's leadership and enthusiasm will bring positive results in his new role.

**Mr. Marovich-** Mr. Marovich echoed earlier comments about supporting local food banks, noting that the ongoing federal government shutdown and delayed appropriations could soon impact funding for assistance programs. He warned that local food banks and SNAP recipients may experience shortages and encouraged residents to donate if they are able, especially those with more resources, to help ensure community members do not go hungry.

**Ms. Michael-** Ms. Michael praised the city's employees and volunteers, highlighting an incident where an off-duty firefighter was first on the scene of a serious accident in her family's yard, assisting the victim until emergency services arrived. She noted that an off-duty police officer and dispatcher, who is married to the firefighter, also helped coordinate the response. Ms. Michael commended their dedication and quick action, calling it a testament to the quality of community members and first responders. She also shared positive observations from a pumpkin contest held by the police dispatch department, noting high morale and teamwork among staff. Additionally, she recognized the Parks Department for their efforts during a recent community event, expressing appreciation for the turnout and the gratitude shown by children and parents. Ms. Michael concluded by reminding residents to vote in the upcoming election, emphasizing the importance of civic participation.

**Mayor's Remarks-** Mayor Seman delivered brief remarks, reminding everyone that the Veterans Day ceremony will take place next Tuesday at 11 a.m. in front of the courthouse. He encouraged attendance, noting its emotional significance. Mayor Seman then shared that he has over 50 years of experience working with the city, including 25 years on the Board of Appeals, 14 years as a Councilman, and 10 years as Mayor, adding that he has long-term observations and recommendations for Council. He emphasized that his focus is on the city's future stability rather than personalities, and indicated he would present his thoughts at an upcoming committee meeting.

Mr. Kairis and Ms. West welcomed the idea, suggesting that the Mayor could provide updates similarly to department heads, including staffing and departmental issues, and encouraged him to take time at a future meeting to share his insights.

Mr. Kairis acknowledged that Council is fortunate for having an experienced advisor to provide guidance for the future.

Mr. Kairis introduced the next agenda item which was an executive session where he proposed a single motion to address both the purchase of property for public purposes, where premature disclosure could create a competitive disadvantage, and ongoing legal matters.
